I am pleased to announce that the Indiana Bar Foundation (IBF) will once again partner with the Indiana Department of Education and to administer the 2011-2012 United States Senate Youth Program (USSYP). The IBF is well-known for its work in civic education through the *We the People: The Citizen and the Constitution* and *We the People: Project Citizen* programs.

You are invited to nominate one outstanding junior or senior from your high school to be considered as a candidate for USSYP, sponsored by the William Randolph Hearst Foundation. **Each principal can nominate one student only.** The nominated student must be serving in an elected, selected or appointed capacity in a student government or in a civic or educational organization, during the 2011-2012 school year.

This program should be advertised to all eligible students. In the event that more than one student seeks your school's nomination, an impartial process should be conducted to select your nominee. The qualities desired in a nominee include: leadership ability, academic achievement, good communication skills, logical thinking and community involvement.

Two students from each state, the District of Columbia, and the Department of Defense Schools will be selected to attend a seminar in Washington, D.C. from March 3<sup>rd</sup> to March 10<sup>th</sup>, 2012. The Hearst Foundation will pay all expenses for the Washington week, including transportation, hotel and meals. Students selected will also be eligible to receive a \$5,000 college scholarship from the Hearst Foundation.

If you would like to nominate a student from your school, please submit your nomination materials **postmarked no later than October 1<sup>st</sup>, 2011** to:

Nomination documents must include the following: 1) a nomination form bearing your signature; 2) a 350-500 word student essay on the assigned prompt; 3) a one-page student resume and 4) a letter of support from you.
